This area grew as a working class neighborhood with a commercial main street when the Oakwood Streetcar started its route north in 1924. We have always been a leader in transit development.

The Pizza Pizza was once the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce. There is still a safe in the basement.

Take Locksley Ave. or Times Rd. to get to Walter Saunders Memorial Park. It has a play scape, splash pad, rock wall for climbing, basketball courts and is part of the 9km Beltline trail.

The cod for the Jamaican dish Ackee and Salt Fish was originally a Canadian export from the Maritimes.

Languages as diverse as Russian, Tagalog and Spanish are among the top 5 languages, other than English spoken, in this neighborhood.
